#### A tribute to the late Graham Brown from his son Alex:

Graham Brown moved to Prescott Mill, near Stottesdon, with his family in 1983. After growing up in the Wirral, he went to university in Keele and Liverpool before becoming a computer programmer and later a systems analyst in London where he started his family. His boys, Al and Ed started primary school in Cleobury Mortimer where Graham become Chairman of the Chamber of Commerce. Graham went on to become a Governor at Bridgnorth Endowed School and was Musical Director of the Bridgnorth Area Youth Orchestra from 2000. He was always heavily involved in music, forging links with the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra and playing the cello in a local chamber group, Bridgnorth Sinfonia and Telford Orchestra. Graham undertook teaching gualifications and became a Lecturer in Information Systems at Wolverhampton University before his retirement in 2011. He was well liked by his students and in fact continued to maintain the universities links with the British College of Applied Studies in Sri Lanka until 2013. Graham was well known by many in and around Stottesdon, and would often make it to the Fox and Hounds or Fighting Cocks for a pint or two. Graham was diagnosed with an inoperable brain tumour earlier this year. He faced his terminal diagnosis philosophically with his characteristic curiosity and shouldered the burden of deteriorating health with great courage. receiving tremendous support from his family and friends. He received outstanding care from Severn Hospice in Shrewsbury and Hagley Place Care Home in Ludlow, where he passed away peacefully in his sleep on 13th July. He is survived by his wife, Wendy, two sons, Al and Ed, daughter-in-law Emma, would-be daughter-in-law Hewi and grandchildren, Maiah and Finbar. In keeping with his well-loved eccentricities, he has donated his body to Keele University Medical School, where he will help to train the next generation of doctors in anatomy. A memorial concert party was held on Saturday 6th September at Bridgnorth Endowed School which was attended by approximately 170 people.

# <u>The toughest 1 day mountain bike in the world - Tour of the Dragon, Bhutan — 6 September</u> 2014

A big congratulations to local cyclist James Griffiths who became the 1<sup>st</sup> British rider to attempt and complete the Tour of the Dragon, a one day 268km extreme mountain bike race in Himalayan Kingdom of Bhutan. With 50% of participants traditionally failing to finish, altitude is one serious factor and acclimatisation essential.

With only 12 weeks to prepare for this challenge, James was doing some pretty straightforward local and national time trials most between 10 -25 miles, with a couple of 50 and 100 milers thrown in for good measure. All great training but nothing to compare with riding at altitude where the Tour of the Dragon participants gain nearly 4000m and lose 4000m of climbing! Especially for an international participant from sea level, one has to keep in mind that race takes you over four high mountain passes which on average are well above over 3000m (9800ft).

With a lot of determination, James managed to overcome these challenges and out of the 43 starters, only 22 finishers, James placed 15<sup>th</sup> in a time of just over 15 hrs. Thanks to a lot of amazing local support and donations, James has raised over £2000 for the charity Spinal Research. This extreme challenge came about thanks to an invitation extended to James by Anthony Eddies-Davies, Live the Adventure Company Director, Stottesdon, courtesy of Anthony's friends and contacts in the Himalayan Kingdom. Anthony is a regular visitor to the country, exploring with unlimited access, working with the Bhutanese to develop new sustainable adventure travel itineraries, guiding private groups, and training river guides in Bhutan.
